Key Findings

- Participation: 196 parents responded (125% increase from 2024).
- Overall Satisfaction: Average overall rating = 3.8/5. Most parents are satisfied, but areas for growth remain.

Strengths Identified

- School Culture: 97% say HOPE is a safe, warm, and welcoming community.
- Parental Involvement: 93% feel satisfied with opportunities; 95% feel welcomed.
- Staff: Parents value teachers' care, dedication, and personal connections with students.
- **Community & Culture:** Families appreciate Hmong language/culture programming and want it expanded.

Areas for Improvement

1. Communication

- o Parents want more timely, clear updates on student progress, events, and changes.
- o Request for multiple communication modes (phone, email, letters, social media).

2. Transportation & Parking

- o Ongoing concerns about bus safety, reliability, stop locations, and overcrowding.
- o Parking during drop-off/pick-up and events remains a consistent issue.

3. Academics & Programs

- o Families want stronger academic programs, more homework, tutoring, and pre-college prep.
- o Requests for expanded after-school activities, sports, clubs, and cultural programming.
- o Additional translation/interpreter support (Hmong, Karen, Spanish) desired.

4. Staff & Systems

o Call for more staff training, consistency across grade levels, and better coordination of processes.

Parent Suggestions

- Expand Hmong/Karen language, culture, and traditions through classes, events, and extracurriculars.
- Increase family engagement: more family nights, parent-teacher meetings, volunteer opportunities.
- Provide more sports, field trips, and clubs.
- Improve lunch quality, parking space, and bus service.

Bottom Line: Parents overall value HOPE's safe, welcoming environment, caring staff, and cultural focus. The biggest priorities for improvement **are** better communication, stronger academic programs, more extracurricular opportunities, and fixing transportation/parking challenges.
